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Shabbat Teaching

## Ma Tovú

In Parashat Balak, when the king of Moab saw the huge host of Israelites coming out of the wilderness, he tried to hire a prophet named Balaam to curse them. When Balaam first asked permission to go curse Israel, Adonai forbade him. However, when King Balak sent a more impressive delegation, Balaam again asked Adonai if he could go (does Adonai change His mind?) In this case, Adonai gave Balaam the desire of his heart but sent leanness to his soul (Palm 106:15). As Balaam was traveling to where Israel was, his donkey (ass) suddenly stopped and refused to go forward: "27When the donkey (ass) saw the angel of Adonai (אַת־מלאר יהוה")..." (Nu. 22:27). Balaam became furious and began beating his donkey (ass) with a rod. The donkey (ass) spoke and gave him a serious message: "31 Then Adonai opened Balaam's eyes, and he saw the angel of Adonai (מלאר יהוה) standing in the road with his drawn sword in his hand. So he fell on his face" (Nu. 22:31). Who is the specific (the et in front of malach) angel of Adonai that spoke to Balaam? Scripture does not say, and the reader may wonder...

Accumulated tension is at the bottom of Balaam's anger because he is in a battle between the lust in his heart and *Adonai*. In my message from 29May21, *Get Rid of All Anger* I discussed the relationship between anger and sexual immorality/pornography, lust, greed, and jealousy. The primary Greek word for *anger* is *orge*, which is the root of the English word *orgy*. Anger carries a very high price tag: it damages both the health of the person who is angry and those to whom it is directed. It damages vital relationships, results in financial loss, and *results* in unwise judgment and destructive behavior. Nevertheless, Balaam goes to where Israel is dwelling and utters the words: *Ma Tovu Ohalecha Yaakov, Mishke-notecha Yisrael*.

"<sup>1</sup>When Balaam realized that it was pleasing in the eyes of Adonai to bless Israel, he did not resort to sorceries as at the other times, but turned his face toward the wilderness. <sup>2</sup>Lifting up his eyes, Balaam saw Israel dwelling by tribes. The Ruach Elohim came over him. <sup>3</sup>He uttered his oracle and said: "This is the oracle of Balaam son of Beor, and the oracle of a strong man whose eye has been opened, <sup>4</sup>the oracle of one hearing God's speech, one seeing Shaddai's vision, one fallen down, yet with open eyes: <sup>5</sup>How lovely are your tents, O Jacob, and your dwellings (dwelling places), O Israel!" (Nu. 24:1-5).

Please notice these details in the text. Firstly, it is *pleasing in the eyes of Adonai to bless Israel*. Secondly, the Ruach Elohim came over him and then he spoke. Thirdly, Balaam said this is the oracle of one hearing God's speech, one seeing Shaddai's vision (not his own vision). The first line of the actual blessing is: "5How lovely are your tents, O Jacob, and your dwellings, O Israel!" Thus, our dwelling places can be lovely!

Was Israel aware that Balaam was making this blessing (or for that matter, it could have been a cursing at the direction of *Balak*, an enemy king) over them? Why did *Adonai* intervene and did not allow Balaam to curse Israel, but instead bless them? On the surface this seems contradictory to the Scripture: "Like a fluttering sparrow or a flying swallow, so an undeserved curse (causeless curse, KJV) does not land" (Prov. 26:2). It must have been VERY IMPORTANT for Israel to receive this blessing (life) instead of a cursing (death)!

Life is often like the old TV show *Let's Make a Deal*. Doors of opportunity present themselves to us and we must choose between them. Once we choose, we are then presented with the consequences of those choices: either Life (the Blessing) or Death (the Curse). In the TV show, people anxiously waited to see the results – and there were always results. Balaam also had to choose. Would he curse or bless *Yisrael*? How powerful could this Blessing or a Curse be? Perhaps a better title for this episode could be: *While Yisrael lived life unaware {not even conscious of their surroundings, the evil one planned their cursing...}*. In Numbers 25:1, Scripture relates that while *Yisrael* was at *Shittim*, they played the harlot with Moabite women and idols. As this was going on, *Adonai* is on the scene (even behind the scenes, if you please) battling the enemy to make it possible for Israel to *inherit the blessing* by *stopping the curse*. In addition, there were human foes who also sought their demise. While Israel was busy living their daily life, *Adonai* was astounding the world with His Supernatural Power. *Adonai* has the power to turn curses into blessings!

The blessing concludes with: "<sup>9</sup>He crouches like a lion or a lioness – who would rouse him? He who blesses you will be blessed, and he who curses you will be cursed" (Nu. 22:9). The same as Gen. 12:3. Awesome!

Scripture tells us that between Numbers 24 and Numbers 25 Balaam figured out a way to collect his reward (his lust of the eyes and flesh) from *Balak*. Balaam advised the Moabites how to entice the people of Israel into grave sin with prostitutes and idolatry. Since he could not curse Israel directly, he came up with a plan for Israel to bring the curse upon themselves. *Balak* followed Balaam's advice, and Israel fell into sin, worshiping *Baal of Peor* and committing fornication with Midianite women. The consequence was an ensuing plague, where 24,000 people died. This is way more people than the potential casualties of a war with Moab! Moses refers to the evil work of Balaam: "...because they hired against you Balaam son of Beor from Petor of Aram-naharaim to curse you. <sup>6</sup>But Adonai your God refused to listen to Balaam, and Adonai your God turned the curse into a blessing for you because He loves you" (Deuteronomy 23:5b-6). In the Psalms we read: "<sup>28</sup>Then they yoked themselves to Baal of Peor, and ate the sacrifices of dead things. <sup>29</sup>So they provoked Him with their deeds, and a plague broke out among them. <sup>30</sup>But Phinehas stood up and intervened, so the plague was stopped. <sup>31</sup>It was credited to him as righteousness, from generation to generation forever" (Psalm 106:28-31)

Similarly, Yeshua, at the direction of the Father, has turned our deserved cursing in to blessing – life and life more abundantly. The enemy cannot bring about an underserved curse upon us, but a deserved consequence is another story. The enemy of Adonai is continually observing our life (our dwelling places) and scheming to curse us. These curses are not imagined, they are real! We are often not even aware that such an evil conniving conspiracy is taking place right under our noses, so to speak. Wake up! We have been blessed by Adonai and His Son Yeshua and we CAN choose the blessing and not the cursing. You have nothing to fear when it comes to curses because Adonai's protective hand is over you. No weapon, curse, or ill will can touch you in the palm of His protective hand (as long as you choose to stay there). Fear not, for He is always with you. Trust Him completely and stay in His dwelling places and DO NOT GIVE THE ENEMY ANY PERMISSION/REASON TO CURSE YOU!

"<sup>1</sup>For the music director, upon the Gittite lyre, a psalm of the sons of Korah. <sup>2</sup>How lovely are Your tabernacles, Adonai-Tzva'ot! <sup>3</sup>My soul yearns, even faints, for the courts of Adonai. My heart and my flesh sing for joy to the living God. <sup>4</sup>Even the sparrow has found a home, and the swallow a nest for herself, where she may lay her young —near Your altars, Adonai-Tzva'ot— my King and my God! <sup>5</sup>Blessed are they who dwell in Your House —they are ever praising You. Selah" (Ps. 84:1-5).

"I How lovely are thy dwelling places. My soul longs for the courts of the Lord. My heart and my flesh sing for joy to the living God. You are my King and my God I"
